



Form W-2c: Submission with CSV file in MyTax Illinois

The CSV (Comma Separated Value) file format is used for importing Form W-2c information file directly to an Illinois Withholding Income Tax account. Form W-2c is submitted to correct a Form W-2 that was previously incorrectly filed with the Illinois Department of Revenue. (If you previously reported an incorrect Form W-2 to the IRS but had not filed it with the Department of Revenue, it is not necessary to submit a W-2c to the Department.)

The import feature is recommended for users who have software that can create a file in CSV format. Using a spreadsheet program (e.g., Excel), create a CSV file with fourteen columns, which will allow it to be recognized and accepted by MyTax Illinois. You may also use a text file that follows the same format.

The file should not have a header row. Each field, except "Middle Name," must contain a value. If a field is not being corrected, enter the same value in both the "Previous" and "Corrected" columns. The file must contain fourteen columns in the same order as the following:

	Field Name	Max Length	Data Type	Description
1st Column	Tax Year	4 characters	Numeric	The tax year listed on the W-2c. Only tax years 2018 and after may be filed with a CSV file. <i>Example: 2018 should be entered as "2018"</i>
2nd Column	Previous Employee SSN	9 characters	Numeric	The originally reported Social Security Number of the employee. <i>Example: "344-44-1234" or "344441234"</i>
3rd Column	Corrected Employee SSN	9 characters	Numeric	The corrected Social Security Number of the employee. <i>Example: "344-44-1234" or "344441234"</i>
4th Column	First Name	15 characters	ASCII characters, no commas	The first name of the employee. <i>Example: "Jon"</i>
5th Column	Middle Name	15 characters	ASCII characters, no commas	The middle name of the employee. This field can be left blank.
6th Column	Last Name	20 characters	ASCII characters, no commas	The last name of the employee. <i>Example: "Doe" or "O'Brien"</i>
7th Column	Previous Federal Earnings		Numeric	The employee's federal earnings as reported on the original Form W-2. Enter as unformatted dollars/cents. <i>Example: \$1,234.56 should be entered as "1234.56"</i>
8th Column	Corrected Federal Earnings		Numeric	The employee's correct federal earnings. Enter as unformatted dollars/cents. <i>Example: \$1,234.56 should be entered as "1234.56"</i>
9th Column	Previous Federal Tax Withheld		Numeric	The employee's tax withheld as reported on the original Form W-2. Enter as unformatted dollars/cents. <i>Example: \$1,234.56 should be entered as "1234.56"</i>
10th Column	Corrected Federal Tax Withheld		Numeric	The employee's correct tax withheld. Enter as unformatted dollars/cents. <i>Example: \$1,234.56 should be entered as "1234.56"</i>
11th Column	Previous Illinois Earnings		Numeric	The employee's Illinois earnings as reported on the original Form W-2. Enter as unformatted dollars/cents. <i>Example: \$1,234.56 should be entered as "1234.56"</i>
12th Column	Corrected Illinois Earnings		Numeric	The employee's correct Illinois earnings. Enter as unformatted dollars/cents. <i>Example: \$1,234.56 should be entered as "1234.56"</i>
13th Column	Previous Illinois Tax Withheld		Numeric	The employee's Illinois withholding as originally reported on Form W-2. Enter as unformatted dollars/cents. <i>Example: \$1,234.56 should be entered as "1234.56"</i>
14th Column	Corrected Illinois Tax Withheld		Numeric	The employee's correct Illinois withholding. Enter as unformatted dollars/cents. <i>Example: \$1,234.56 should be entered as "1234.56"</i>

Example:

Your employee is Jane Q. Public. Her original 2018 Form W-2 filed with the Illinois Department of Revenue listed her Social Security Number as 333-22-1111, but you need to correct this to 333-11-2222. You also need to correct her Illinois withholding amount from \$15 to \$1500. The rest of her Form W-2 information is unchanged. Her Form W-2c would be filed as follows:

CSV Spreadsheet Example (e.g. Excel)

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Text File Example (e.g. Notepad)

Save your file using the file type “**CSV — Comma Separated Values.**”

You may also upload simple text files with fields separated by commas and with each record separated by a hard return.

Once you have your file saved in this format, select “Import W-2c File” in MyTax Illinois.
